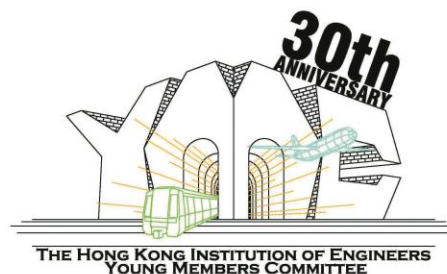

Introduction

Since the establishment in 1985, YMC is having its 30th Anniversary this year. MC's vision is to serve the need of young members and nurture young engineers to become future leaders in the engineering industry, the society and internationally. With great contributions from our predecessors of the past 29 years, YMC continues to deliver quality services to our members. With over five thousand Registered Young Members (RYMs) from 21 engineering disciplines, YMC stands alone as one of the most prominent young engineers' bodies in Hong Kong.

In order to echo the theme of the HKIE and promote engineering to the public, the theme of this session is "Engineer the Next". With the advice from Past Chairman and efforts from committee members, co-opted members, event coordinators and helpers, we have organized over 100 events in this session, from seminars to site visits, from training camp to sport events. All these events enriched the four objectives namely "Professional Enhancement", "Personal Development", "Global Exposure" and "Community Engagement" under the theme.

Professional Enhancement

As a learned society, we continue to arrange technical seminars and visits to broaden members' knowledge in different professional disciplines. Various topics of seminars and visits included, but were not limited to, sustainable development, infrastructure, green buildings, 3D printing, material science and biomedical technology etc. In particular, we organized a series of special events, "Sharing with the Secretary", which provides a platform for members to communicate with senior government officers on engineering related topics.

Personal Development

Apart from the technical competence, we also enhanced members' personal development by organizing various work-life balance activities from soft skills to leisure events. Under this objective, we organized "Health and Life Balance Series" and "Facing to Social Challenge Series" with Seminar on Stress Management, Public Relations Skills Workshops and Cultural Tour etc, by Non-technical Programme Group, Social, Culture & Arts Group and Sports & Recreation Group.

Global Exposure

We encourage our members to widen their exposure in the international arena by organizing overseas delegation and attending international conference. In this session, we organized an Overseas Delegation to the Netherlands and attended the 21st Young Engineers of ASEAN Federation of Engineering Organization Conference. Members obtained valuable experience through organizing and attending these events.

Community Engagement

To promote the positive image of engineering professional to public, we encourage our young engineers to contribute to society by using their professional knowledge and skills. We organized various community services such as mentorship programme to help the underprivileged, elderly visit and activity with mental retardation children.

With the great effort from all of you, YMC has a fruitful 30th session. INTERVIEW WITH

IR RICHARD LAU

YMC CHAIRMAN, SESSION 1997/1998

This year is the 30th anniversary of YMC. YMC was established in 1985. Do you want to know more about YMC in the old days? Are you interested to know what difficulties YMC has encountered in the past? Would you like to discover more about the development of YMC?

To answer the above questions, we have invited several Past Chairmen of YMC to share with us their valuable memories and experiences.

L: Ir Richard LAU
(YMC Founding Chairman 1985/1986 & 1986/1987)
R: Reporter

R: Why was YMC established? And how did you become the YMC chairman in the first session?

L: As a young engineer, we have to develop ourselves. Institution shall give us a chance to evaluate ourselves. There was a pool of experienced engineers in the HKIE who shall give us advices to optimize our learning. There was a need of gathering the young engineers to train them up and to be the successors of engineering society. YMC was a good platform for us.

There was a student section in the HKIE and I was a chairman. However, after my graduations, I cannot continue to help the HKIE and there was no other way for me to contribute in the engineering society. When I participated in the HKIE activities, there was no other young engineer in similar age with me. Most of the participants were experienced engineers who I hard to communicate with due to generation gap. And at the time, HQs would like to establish a graduate section since the student section was failed to pass on. I discussed with HQs and recruited committee members through the HKIE Journal. This was the start of the establishment of YMC.

R: How many committee members were there in the first session of YMC?

L: At that time, only 4 members recruited and I was in the leading post. 5 of us didn't know each other and didn't have confidence on the succession of YMC; however, we had a heart! We foresaw that there was a need of young members section as the graduates shall not be disconnected. Only senior members showed up in the HKIE activities and that was not a healthy situation. Young Engineers had no affiliation to the HKIE and they merely treated the HKIE as an institution for registration. The beginning objectives of YMC were only a supplement to the HKIE events and to establish a fellowship among the young engineers. We focused on the social functions such as BBQ and Community Chest Walk. This was because we believed that other learned society shall take part in the technical sector.

R: Have you encountered any difficulties in the early establishment of YMC?

L: We were looked like a services provider, to encourage young engineers to join the HKIE events. We wanted to contribute the HKIE. However, the growth of YMC was very slow, which seems like to the end. We were depressed, but we worked hard to find successors. Thanked Hung brothers, they were willing to accept the task and continue the YMC. I'm glad to know the YMC nowadays is so large and strong. This was unexpected at our days.

R: What are the differences between the young engineers in Hong Kong compared to the Australia?

L: You are more active in the institution; Australians aren't. They are more focus on their works while you are all nowadays likely to be a full time role in institution. I can't believe that you can organize over a hundred of activities annually. Management and leadership skills are required. I'm amazed.

I have also established the HKIE Australia chapter in Australia 5 years ago. Hope it can be grown like YMC.

R: Do you have any advice to the YMC nowadays?

L: YMC is good enough comparing to my days, but it can be better. Every session should have a review on the activities held. We shall not hold a meaningless event, and we should think carefully when we are planning an activity. Moreover, would there be any activities which can be held elsewhere rather than organized by our own? We shall spend our time to the core events. Don't overload yourselves. I'm very grateful to know the YMC is stronger and bigger. Hope you all can keep the success.

**J: Ir Dr Joseph CHI
(YMC Chairman 1991/1992)**

R: Reporter

R: How did you work in YMC?

J: I worked for YMC for not more than 5 years. I was a committee member of YMC in 1990, and became the chairman of YMC of 1991/1992. After that, I still joined YMC for several years.

R: What are your memorable memories in YMC?

J: I had lots of memorable memories in YMC. First, we had the first ever YMC's delegation exchanging ideas with foreign young engineers overseas. We chose Australia to be our first overseas country. Second, we were the first ever YMC inviting a senior engineer to be our advisor. I recalled that he was Ir Edmund Leung, and he also led our trip to Australia. Third, in order to listen to more opinions from young female engineers, we were the first ever YMC with a female committee. Fourth, Ir C K HUNG got married when he was the chairman of YMC of the year of 1990/1991. Coincidentally, I also got married when I was the chairman of YMC. Fifth, in order to convey opinions from young engineers to each division and the Council, I wrote a letter and phoned to divisions and councils for a post for YMC representatives. Originally, my request was rejected. Thankful to our advisor for his great help, the divisions and the Council changed their minds. I think the first division to giving us a post for YMC representatives was the Civil Division.



R: How did you promote the events and activities back in those days?

J: We could only use a pinkpage of HKIE's monthly journals to promote the events and the activities since there were no mobile phones, E-newsletters, E-notices and WhatsApp. That was why we needed to prepare the events and activities much earlier than nowadays. And the difficulties in promotion explained why not many activities were organized at that time.

R: Apart from that, what were your other difficulties to promote the events and the activities?

J: I think the number of helpers was not enough. Also, our budget was not as much as nowadays. Now YMC can get support from sponsors easily. Moreover, in my days, YMC was not very famous. It was difficult to attract people to join YMC's events and activities.

R: What suggestions / expectations would you give to YMC?

J: YMC has done a great job already. I hope that they can keep organizing many activities, upholding their team spirit and their creativity. Besides, I have observed that nowadays teenagers have not been satisfied with the current society. I hope that YMC can be a model to those teenagers.

R: What is the challenge for engineers in the future?

J: The main challenge is that the public do not know engineers well as they do not have many chances to contact with the engineers. If people get sick, they would find a doctor. If they have arguments, lawyers could help them. If a MCB board was tripped, they would find an electrical worker to fix it. However, they seldom approach engineers. Therefore, I hope that engineers keep working hard and let the public understand our contributions.

R: Could you give me a word to describe YMC?

J: I would say "Energetic" as YMC today organizes many activities.

R: What is your feeling about the 30th anniversary of YMC?

J: Time flies. I feel happy, touched and thankful.

R: What are the differences between engineering graduates back then and today?

J: The engineering graduates were hardworking in general in my days. Nowadays, in my observation, some graduates are also hard working, selfless and ambitious.

R: What are the differences between YMC back then and today?

J: Owing to the use of advanced communication technology, YMC today can hold lots of activities. Back then, YMC organized at most two events in a month.

R: Did you join any HKIE affairs after taking part in YMC?

J: Yes, I did. I joined the Structural Division for 11 or 12 years. I was the Past Chairman of the Safety Specialist Committee and now I am the Treasurer of the group. Moreover, I am a committee member of the Civil Division and the Material Division and an Honorary Treasurer of the Gas Division. I hope that today young engineers will take part in more activities and improve the status of engineers.

R: What is your biggest achievement in HKIE?

J: The HKIE gave me high status. I would not get such achievement without the HKIE. I regard the HKIE as my mother and my family.



INTERVIEW WITH

IR PROF C F LAM

YMC CHAIRMAN, SESSION 1992/1993

**L: Ir Prof C F LAM
(YMC Chairman 1992/1993)**

R: Reporter

R: When did you join YMC?

L: A friend approached me and asked me to join YMC. As such, I joined YMC in 1990. I served YMC until 1992, when I became the Chairman of YMC.

R: When you were the Chairman of YMC, did you encounter female committee members?

L: I think we broke a record in the 1992/1993 session. We had a total of 12 members in the committee and half of them were female. It was a breakthrough at that time. It also showed that female engineers could also be very active in the committee.

R: Nowadays, more female choose to become engineers. What impact do you think this has?

L: Engineering is traditionally a male-dominated industry, especially in the 1980s and 1990s. The events with the participation of female engineers would always be full-house. With half of our committee being female members, our committee kept a strong appeal to all engineers. Moreover, female engineers were more considerate and meticulous, which contributed a lot to both engineering work and YMC affairs. The events organized by female members were planned in great detail.



R: At that time, how did you organize the events and activities when the telecommunication was not as good as today?

L: back then, the computer and e-mail had already been very popular, though there were still some challenges in the past compared to the members using WhatsApp and Facebook today. However, these challenges also trained up our endurance and organization skills. Sometimes the events required the helpers to connect with old members who were rather difficult to reach. It would take our helpers much time and effort. So our early members were very patient.

Most importantly, members needed to have the enthusiasm in organizing committee activities. The enthusiasm to serve the committee would help us overcoming any difficulties and coordinating well with different people.

R: Being a good engineer not only requires technical skills, but also a broad social network. We know that you started a seminar series called “Young or Ready”, can you introduce this series to us?

L: This series started back then and continues to this day. I believe it is one of the most long-living events in YMC. The early concept of this event was to help our young engineers to acquire professional qualification when they had limited resources and external aid. Young members would have extra opportunities to acquire shared knowledge and experience in this “young or Ready” series. Sometimes the speakers would provide special strategies and skills for members to acquire the professional skills. Many members found such event useful to become a professional engineer. The event has gained great success, and I believe the series is a very good event series.

R: How would you compare engineers today and engineers in the past? Are there any points which young engineers should pay more attention to?

L: First of all, the young engineers today are very lucky. There are far more opportunities for young engineers today. In the past, we had less experience and smaller social network, so we needed to strive for our own opportunities to develop ourselves in harsh circumstances, no matter in personal development or professional development. Nowadays, we are glad that the HKIE has spared expense and efforts on young engineers. Here, I would like to emphasize “heartfelt”. If you are heartfelt, you will always find your way in life. The first priority for the young engineers is to join the YMC. It gives you such a good chance to start making new friends with similar age and background, expanding your vision to different disciplines and enhancing your own skills. I would say that young engineers shall have a lot of opportunities.

R: Can you foresee any future difficulties young engineers will come across?

L: Our young members are having a lot of advantages and opportunities, but challenges as well. Now the world is under the process of globalization. The competition between local and foreign engineers are fierce. I suggest young engineers just being yourself and keeping your improvement. Technical skill is still the base, but beyond that, they need to try to apply the skills in daily work and solve problems; moreover, try to cultivate leadership skill and communication skill. Only in this way can we achieve continuous self-improvement and be ever successful.

R: You have just mentioned the world is in globalization process, what do you think of the advantages of local engineers?

L: Hong Kong is a blessed place which has both advantages in the geographical location and the overall social development. The development of Hong Kong is integrated with both Mainland and foreign countries. Sometimes we will export our professionals to foreign countries or to China, in order to promote the engineering project development. This is our edge.

Yet we should stay humble. We need to self-improve and enrich ourselves constantly. We also need to learn to cooperate with engineers from foreign countries and China. An engineering team is no one-man army, it is teamwork. Our engineers shall also be able to work with expertise in different disciplines like architects, surveyors, lawyers, ecologists etc.. We need to stay open-minded, so that we can work with people from different professional backgrounds and from different places.

As Hong Kong is a diversified society, we wish our young engineers can accept different opinions and seek common points while spotting the difference. Our mission as engineers is to improve the living quality. Being a member of the community, we shall take the social responsibility and to feed back the society which has bred us. As an experienced engineer, I will give as much opportunities as I can to help young engineers.

INTERVIEW WITH

IR ALEX LEUNG

YMC CHAIRMAN, SESSION 1997/1998

A: Ir Alex LEUNG

(YMC Chairman 1997/1998)

R: Reporter

R: Can you share your experience in YMC with us?

A: I learnt about YMC from reading the HKIE journal – The Hong Kong Engineer. The announcement of the annual YMC Delegation impressed me. I would like to join that delegation to learn more about the power plant development in Canada. The theme of the Delegation matched my profession as I am in Mechanical Engineering Discipline. After the delegation, our Delegation Chairlady, Grace invited me to join the next nomination of YMC committee. I served as the honorary secretary in the first year, deputy chairman in the second year and then I became the chairman. I have spent not only 5 years serving YMC, as I am still devoted to assisting in YMC events afterwards.

R: Has there anybody or anything that were impressive during your service in YMC?

A: Certainly. As I mentioned before, Grace, YMC first chairlady, she was so energetic to lead the whole team. She was eager to provide learning opportunities and keen on motivating the team. The most impressive thing is that I have adopted some revolutionary changes in the structure of YMC. In the year of 1997/1998 when I served as the YMC Chairman, I created a new system for distinguishing 10 working groups under YMC. I realised it would be a better way to cope with such large workloads by our limited human resources in a more organized way. Each working group would assign a group leader to coordinate with every single helper. Every group communicated and interacted with each other regularly and efficiently. What's more, a significant 56% increase of Registered Young Members (RYM) was also recorded that year.



R: What would you comment about the female members' proportion when comparing with the male members in your days?

A: When I was the YMC Chairman, approximately 1/3 of YMC committee members were female. In the session before I served as Chairman, Christine led YMC as the Chairlady. And before Christine, Grace was the Chairlady to lead YMC. These showed how our female members have performed outstandingly and led YMC to advancements.

R: Do you think the experience you gained from YMC have become advantages in your career and further development?

A: Undoubtedly. In daily life, we used to work with the people who shared the same or similar disciplines. However, in YMC, we have the chance to meet and cooperate with people from completely different background and professions. It is an exciting way to widen our horizon and a great chance to interact with the other members.

In addition to peer groups, we could meet some senior instructors and mentors from various disciplines and divisions. All these instructors including the President were willing to offer assistance and learning opportunities for us to try and explore. The life experience they shared with us enhanced our views and vision.

R: What are your views / opinions toward graduate engineers nowadays?

A: As engineers, we analyse and solve problems in a rational way. Regarding the technological advancements, the engineering techniques became diversifying. Nowadays, the drawings are not limited in 2-D manner which are drawn with Auto-CAD but also 3-D drafting by Building Information Modelling (BIM). When we talk about the personal development of today's young engineers, I would say they are smart and open-minded. They are intelligent; however, they lack the opportunities to learn from drawbacks and challenges.



R: What do you foresee to be the future challenges to engineers?

A: Young engineers shall be well-prepared for future challenges. Ranging from the construction methods to facilities managements, there will be changes in the future. Apart from the professional practices, stakeholders' engagement is also of utmost importance. Engineers in the future also have to take more care of our environment protection. They shall learn from the previous and create the future.

R: Thank you so much for spending your precious time with us, Ir Leung. To wrap up, may I invite you to describe YMC by using an adjective?

A: I would choose 'energetic'. As this year is the 30th Anniversary of YMC, I hope YMC can improve from the past experiences and innovate the future engineering development.

R: Are there any reasons that prompt you to establish "Forever Young Alumni" (FYA)?

A: YMC members are for HKIE members under 35 and once they reach this age they would not be qualified as YMC members. I regarded losing such a large amount of human resources per year as a pity since part of them may not be able to join the Committee of other divisions. That was why I came up with this idea. YMC members are our HKIE outstanding manpower thus they should have a long-lasting platform to serve our Institution. I was glad the YMC Past Chairmen supported my idea to establish a division for our alumni. The division should be established to promote and organize activities for the HKIE YMC alumni to put our talented members together.

R: What are the difficulties encountered in the establishment of FYA?

A: First of all, we had to let people know about FYA. Since it was just established and only few knew about, we spent great amount of time and human resources to promote FYA. We are blessed that our President and Board of Executives all supported our suggestion, this meant a lot for us. Meanwhile, it was extraordinarily difficult to search for all the previous YMC past members to help them register in FYA. Some information such as personal details and contacts might have been lost. Fortunately, all the past YMC Chairmen were keen on assisting us, their contributions built the cornerstone of FYA.

R: Reporter

R: When and how did you join YMC?

T: I joined YMC in 1992. It all started with a delegation to Boston visiting a water treatment plant. After, I served YMC as a committee member.

Z: I joined YMC in 1996 during a member recruitment session.

R: How long have you serviced YMC?

T: I served YMC from 1992 to 1999, a total of 7 years.

R: How was the ratio of male to female members back then?

Z: During my year of presidency, half of the members were female engineers.

T: When I joined YMC, there were only few female members in YMC. Due to that reason, some female Chairladies were able to extend their years of serving (from 1 year to 2 years).

R: How did the involvement of female members in YMC help its development?

T: Since male and female members typically have different working styles, for instance, female members tend to work on the details while male members usually put their focus on the big picture, a well mix of members assisted the group to organize events with more comprehensive preparation.



R: Would you share about the challenges faced by YMC?

T: We had difficulties in finding members and helpers for YMC due to limited promotion channels. We made a great effort to promote YMC and recruit committee members. We also established different activity groups to gather new members.

R: What were the promotion channels during that time?

Z: We typically used emails and pinkpage for event promotions while registrations were usually made by facsimiles.

T: We made some changes to attract young members, including the use of more photos and less words in activity reports. We also tried to build a group of “loyalty members” through strengthened and targeted communications with them.

R: Would you like to talk more about the trip with Sowers Action in 2003?

Z: Initially we had about 6-7 engineers who showed interest to join the service. Despite the fact that only 2 engineers joined the trip due to the concerns associated with the spread of SARS, a lot of engineers helped us in the preparation and support work.

R: What do you think about the recent development of YMC?

Z: YMC has a lot of new initiatives, which is good, especially in organizing overseas delegations. Its members have a lot of new ideas in organizing events.

R: Any ideas for the future development of YMC?

T: The YMC could bring forward its ideas with confidence and organize more new events.

R: What do you think about the new challenges of engineers?

T: The media sector has been developing rapidly over the past decades. We are exposed to huge amount of information everyday. So it's important that engineers filter the information carefully before using them.

Z: Moreover, we should utilize our logical thinking skills and scientific knowledge to analyze the comments from public media too.

R: Would you tell us more about the difficulties you faced during the organization of YMC events?

Z: We were lucky that our members were very supportive, especially during donations for delegations. It was, however, quite difficult to handle the administration works. For example, we received more than 1,000 registrations from our members for a charity event with “The Community Chest of Hong Kong”.

R: What was your major achievement during your service in YMC?

T: I made a lot of friends in YMC, especially with experienced engineers; it brought me new horizons from different levels and backgrounds.

Z: A lot of us are able to keep our friendship throughout the years. We still meet up regularly. It was also a good chance to polish our presentation skills and time management skills through the organization of various events.

R: What do you think about the new generation of young engineers?

T: The young engineers are more active to voice their comments and ideas. They also have more creativity and willingness to utilize new technologies.

R: Does your participation in YMC benefit your career development in the engineering field?

T: As I said, the YMC experience helped me to better communicate with engineers in senior positions. Also, it helped me to think more deeply and diversely when handling different problems. We were also able to build a network to help one another on technical issues.

Z: It helped me to polish my organization skills, and share one another's experience.

Visits Group (VG)

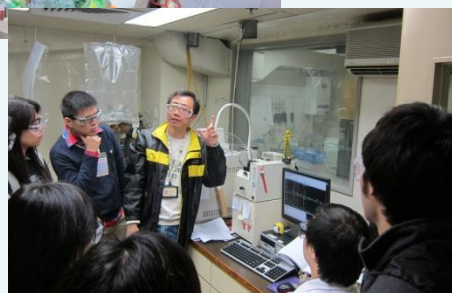

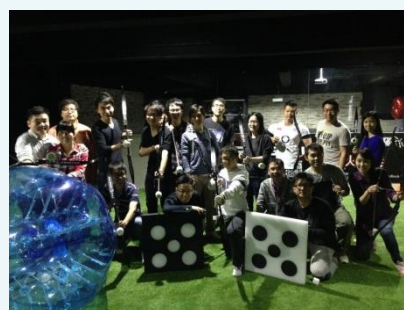
Non-technical Program Group (NPG)

Last but not least, I would like to express my gratitude to my beloved helpers for your support throughout the year, making every activity a success.



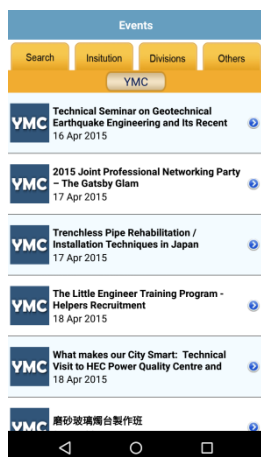
Public Relations Group (PRG)

32nd CAFEO & 21st YEAFEO Conference

10 - 13 NOVEMBER 2014 / YANGON, MYANMAR

The 32nd Conference of the Association of Southeast Asian Nations (ASEAN) Federation of Engineering Organisation (CAFEO 32) in conjunction with the 21st Meeting of Young Engineers of ASEAN Federation of Engineering Organisation (YEAFEO 21) is the highlighted event of the ASEAN Federation of Engineering Organisation (AFEO).

AFEO is an organisation of the national engineering/technological institutions of the ten ASEAN member countries including Brunei Darussalam, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam.

CAFEO has been held annually at the different member institutions in a rotating alphabetical order since 1982. CAFEO historically attracts more than 200 foreign and 300 local engineering professionals from various industries, fields and sectors. CAFEO 32, hosted by the Myanmar Engineering Society (MES), was held at Yangon, Myanmar this year.

Besides organising the annual conference known as CAFEO hosted in rotation, member institutions also held the yearly AFEO government board meeting. In 1993 the committee of young engineers was set up and in 1994, the bylaws of the formation of a young engineer group were approved and the definition of the Young Engineer was agreed. The group name was the Young Engineers of ASEAN Federation of Engineering Organisation (YEAFEO). Its mission is to be a dynamic and progressive organisation that leads to the development of young engineers in the ASEAN region. This year is the 21st board meeting of YEAFEO.

In the YEAFEO 21, the YMC delegates attended the YEAFEO board meeting as observers and several issues, such as the cooperation amongst ASEAN countries, were discussed. The YEAFEO Country Report Session was held before the board meeting. Representatives from all countries, including Hong Kong, took turns to give a brief introduction on their organizations. Our Honorary Treasurer, Ms Candy FUNG and our Committee Member, Ms Yani KO, grasped the opportunity to introduce the HKIE and YMC to the audience. Yani presented the structure of YMC and the past YMC activities and upcoming events to all other countries and invited them to visit Hong Kong and the HKIE in the future. We received cordial welcome from the other delegates. Some countries such as Japan and Malaysia had even shown immediate interest to visit Hong Kong.

The delegates also attended the technical seminars and technical visits of the conference. Different speakers were invited to present the topics related to Research, Education and Capacity Building; Transportation and Logistic; Energy and Environmental; and Disaster Preparedness, Mitigation and Management. The four young engineers have learned new technical knowledge and ideas in these areas.

There was a closing ceremony in the evening of 12th November 2014. After the ceremony, each country needed to conduct a performance during the farewell dinner. The Hong Kong delegates sang the songs that were representing the energetic city, the Hong Kong SAR.

In all, the YEAFEO 21 is really a splendid occasion for young engineers to expose themselves to new experiences, to learn more and to contribute their knowledge.

YMC 30th Anniversary Special Event

– Sharing with the Secretary (Development)

3 MARCH 2015

YMC was honoured to invite Mr Paul M P CHAN, Secretary for Development, on 3 March 2015 for this special event for YMC 30th Anniversary. Mr CHAN shared his work experience as well as views on Hong Kong's planning and development policy with us. He began by giving a presentation entitled "Future Development of Hong Kong Challenges and Way out" which gave an overview of the Government's new and on-going initiatives on our city's planning and development.

Mr CHAN first stressed that the best way to maintain our competitiveness is to continue the momentum of infrastructure development as investment in infrastructure can drive the economy, create employment opportunities and improve people's livelihood. He then shared with us some sustainable features under Energizing Kowloon East including the concept of "walkable" Kowloon East and "Smart City", and also economic benefit brought by Hong Kong-Zhuhai-Macao Bridge by developing bridgehead economy. In addition, the development of New Development Areas (NDAs) including Hung Shui Kiu NDAs, North East New Territories NDAs together with the development of cavern and reclamation outside Victoria Harbour are the important sources of land supply in medium and long term.

Mr CHAN emphasized that the city's land planning and development must reflect the overall interests of Hong Kong although there have been many controversies and uncertainties in consultation process, such as the filibustering and the uncooperative movement in the Legislative Council (LegCo) and uncertainties brought by judicial reviews. Therefore, rational and multi-party discussions jointly with different stakeholders can facilitate communication. The citizens should put the overall interests of the community before their political wrangling and work with the Government to lead the sustainable development of Hong Kong. Furthermore, there have been continuing efforts between the Government and construction industry including Construction Industry Council (CIC) in promoting construction manpower development with a view to facilitate healthy growth and encourage innovation for the construction industry.

Ir Dr Hon W K LO was the facilitator in the Q&A session and members raised many interesting questions. Mr CHAN shared how he picked up the works of Secretary for Development within a short period of time with support from the professional civil servants and his working philosophy is to appreciate others and work together with a common aspiration. There were a lot of interesting discussions between our young members and Mr CHAN. This seminar created a fantastic environment and valuable opportunity for our young members to have a face-to-face interaction with the senior management officer of the Hong Kong Government. At last, we would like to express our most sincere gratitude to Mr Paul CHAN for his sharing despite his busy schedule.



YMC 30th Anniversary Special Event

– Sharing with the Secretary

(Transport and Housing)

27 APRIL 2015

The YMC was honoured to invite Professor Anthony B L CHEUNG, Secretary for Transport and Housing, to this special event for the YMC 30th Anniversary on 27 April 2015 to give an overview of the government's new and on-going initiatives on our city's Transport and Housing.

He first stressed the importance of a comprehensive transportation system in maintaining Hong Kong's competitiveness. He shared with us that the suggestion in the "Study on the Strategic Development Plan for Hong Kong Port 2030" was still under review for strengthening the existing port facilities in order to grasp the opportunity brought by "One Belt, One Road". Four railway projects are still under construction and the government now was preparing the planning work for some recommended railway projects suggested by the "Railway Development Strategy 2014". The government would soon commence the "Public Transport Strategy Study" to review the overall strategic arrangements of public transport services which enhanced the complementarities amongst the various public transport services and their sustainability.



Housing was one of the major concerns for many members. The Long Term Housing Strategy (LTHS) was promulgated by the government, and a public-to-private split of 60:40 set in respect of new housing supply in order to gradually avert the imbalance of the current supply-and-demand market. The government will not hesitate to introduce appropriate measures when necessary in order to maintain a stable property market. In regards to the private residential property market, the Government would implement the regular Land Sale Programme and enhance the land administration processes.

Professor CHEUNG emphasised that the overall interests of Hong Kong must be considered for infrastructure development despite of many controversies such as the three-runway system (3RS) in Hong Kong International Airport. The existing two-runway system would likely reach its maximum practical capacity in 2016 or 2017 and Hong Kong was now facing intensifying competition from airports in neighbouring cities such as Singapore and Seoul. As a result, there was an urgent need for the implementation of the 3RS project to meet Hong Kong's long-term air traffic demand and to maintain our overall competitiveness.

With Ir Dr Hon W K LO as the facilitator of the Q&A session, participants raised several interesting questions. We would like to express our sincere gratitude to Professor CHEUNG for his sharing.



YMC Overseas Delegation 2015 to the Netherlands

- Living with Water, Building with Nature

28 MARCH – 7 April 2015

Since 1991, the Young Members Committee (YMC) of the Hong Kong Institution of Engineers (HKIE) has organized delegations to various parts of the world, ranging from Australia, Dubai, Denmark, the UK, Canada, Germany to New Zealand. These delegations arouse young engineers' potential in leadership and motivated their vision to learn from overseas good practices. This session, YMC jointly organized a delegation to The Netherlands from 28th March 2015 to 7th April 2015 with the HKIE-CPDC. It is our honour to have nine distinguished senior members from the HKIE as our advisors to support us. One of the advisors, Ir Victor CHEUNG, the President of the HKIE joined the delegation trip with sixteen young engineers from different backgrounds.

With the theme "Living with Water, Building with Nature", we focused on three main study areas: Water Infrastructure Cooperation, Waste Management and Recycling and Sustainable Transportation. The Netherlands is a country where over 40% of its land lies below sea level. With long history of fighting against water, different world renowned water infrastructures were built since the 1920s. The country also has a high reputation on waste management and recycling system including the adoption of state-of-the-art technology in the waste-to-energy plants. During our visit, we explored the latest developments and technologies in the three mentioned study areas.





In addition to the technical seminars and visits, we had exchange meetings as well as social gathering with The Royal Netherlands Society of Engineers and Delft University of Technology.

In preparation of the trip, we arranged a series of local seminars and visits related to the delegation theme to enrich knowledge of delegates and our young members. Each delegate also carried out local research and review on the latest development of the water infrastructure, waste management and transportation. After the delegation, delegates would publish a report and organize a debriefing session, sharing the findings from the delegation in June 2015.

Last but not least, we would like to express our sincere thanks to our advisors, sponsors, hosting organizations and delegates for their support and contribution to this delegation.
